CHARACTERISTICS AND OBJECTIVES

CEBRAP's International Postdoctoral Program (IPP) is now receiving application from doctors with a Ph.D. in anthropology, political science, demography, law, economics, philosophy, history, and sociology, and whose research interests are aligned with those of CEBRAP's research groups – <https://cebrap.org.br/nucleos/>

The program is meant to complement the training of doctors by providing them with an interdisciplinary experience and thus enabling them to tackle research topics beyond the boundaries of the fields in which they have been trained. The program also expects that an international group of doctors will allow for a comparative framework in researched topics. As a result, CEBRAP hopes to provide scholars with a broader view of the major issues in our contemporary societies.

The post-doctoral program began in 2016 and draws on CEBRAP's successful previous experience, the Cadre Training Program (1986-2002), which later changed into the Postdoctoral Program (2003-2007), in which 116 young researchers took part. Their success is attested by the large number of both programs' researchers having achieved prominent positions at Brazilian universities and other institutions.

The IPP is in its sixth class (2017-2022). It currently has 20 postdoctoral researchers conducting research in Brazil or at international institutions. To learn more about their work in progress, we invite you to visit the program's website: <https://cebrap.org.br/ipp/>

HOW THE PROGRAM WORKS

The IPP will select a group of up to 10 doctors from different nationalities, who earned their Ph.D. in Brazil or abroad.

Beginning on August 10th, 2023, the program lasts for at least two years, with the option of a stay at a foreign institution (see below for the list of partner institutions) funded by postdocs' own scholarships. As an option, the researcher can extend his/her participation in the program for up to two extra years.

The post-doctoral program is grounded on research activity. Postdoctoral researchers might develop their project under the supervision of CEBRAP senior researchers (PhDs for over 10 years) and can become part of their research teams, choosing topics related to ongoing studies in the institution (see below for a list of available supervisors and topics). In that case, the candidate's

research proposal will also be evaluated by the supervisor to be indicated by the candidate in the application form.

Postdoctoral researchers will participate in three mandatory and regular activities:

1. *Weekly research seminar (Thursdays)* in which postdocs successively present their initial project, partial results, and a final written product (article, book chapter, book). This seminar aims at following the project development in its several stages: object definition, theoretical approach, research design, research strategies, and partial and final results. The weekly seminars are held remotely (by Zoom) or in a hybrid format so those who do not live in São Paulo can also engage themselves in participating. Seminar attendance is mandatory.
2. *Once-a-year thematic seminar (August)* with the participation of CEBRAP researchers as well as national and international guests. Open to the academic community, the thematic seminar is an occasion for the post-docs to present the results of their work to the public.
3. Submission for publication of an article or book at the end of the program.

Postdoctoral researchers should also:

1. Be active participants in CEBRAP's collective activities (seminars and debates) as well as in their affiliated research group, if it is the case.
2. Present their research proposals in the Weekly Research Seminar before submitting their funding applications.

EVALUATION

The postdoctoral researchers will have their final product (book or article) evaluated by the IPP Academic Committee.

Participants that meet the program's requirements will receive an achievement certificate.

APPLICATION

Required documentation (in English, Portuguese, or Spanish):

1. Application form (see the model at <https://cebrap.org.br/ipp/>);
2. Research project (up to 20 pages, including an initial half-page summary);
3. *Curriculum vitae* (up to 4 pages);
4. Letter stating the reasons for the candidate's interest in the program (up to 2 pages);
5. 1 (one) article or paper, published or unpublished, that the candidate considers the best example of his/her academic production;
6. Ph.D. diploma (or equivalent);

7. 2 (two) recommendation letters to be sent directly to our email – postdoc@cebrap.org.br;
8. Proof of English proficiency for fluent reading and speaking: TOEFL or equivalent – score over 71, or a statement of advanced knowledge of English, or a description of a significant previous international experience;
9. Updated personal profile on the websites Academia.edu and Research Gate.

SELECTION PROCESS

Class: up to 10 doctors per year.

Selection method:

Partner institutions' candidates will be selected by them – up to 2 postdocs per year per institution.

All other candidates will submit to the following procedures:

First phase (until **March 31st, 2023**): evaluation of the submitted documentation and research project;

Second phase if necessary (until **April 14th, 2023**): personal or online interview with the potential supervisor.

Results will be announced up to **April 28th, 2023** via email (postdoc@cebrap.org.br). Approved postdoctoral researchers will receive a formal acceptance letter.

Deadline for enrollment fee: **May 26th, 2023**.

The program starts on **August 10th, 2023**.

AFFIRMATIVE ACTION

Two positions will be fulfilled by candidates that declare themselves blacks or descendants of indigenous groups. People applying through this policy will be exempted from the payment of the enrollment fee. If you are eligible to affirmative action and are willing to benefit from it, please indicate this in the application form.

FUNDING

The program operation is funded by CEBRAP and there are no additional charges to postdoctoral researchers. The sole requirement is that postdocs pay the **selection fee** of R\$ 150,00 and the **enrollment fee** of R\$ 1.275,00. No enrollment fee will be required from candidates selected by partner institutions nor from those selected through affirmative action.

The Program does not offer scholarships but gives institutional support for those post-docs willing to apply for Brazilian and foreign funding agencies.

Postdocs living abroad should be provided through their own resources, their institutions of origin, or international funding institutions with official support from CEBRAP.

Postdoctoral researchers living in Brazil, whether Brazilians or foreigners, may resort to their own resources or apply for a national scholarship, with official support from CEBRAP.

Postdoctoral researchers funded by FAPESP (or other funding institution) must meet the rules and requirements of the funding institution as well as the program's norms. Adrián Gurza Lavallo

Adrián Gurza Lavallo is a professor in the Department of Political Science at the University of São Paulo (FFLCH-USP). He is a member of the Management Committee for the Centre for the Future State – University of Sussex.

Research areas: associativism and civil society; participative institutions and participation; democratic theory and democratic innovation; representation theories.

Alexandre de Freitas Barbosa

Alexandre de Freitas Barbosa is an Economist with a Masters in Economic History from USP (1997) and a PhD in Applied Economics from UNICAMP (2003). Comin is a Professor of Sociology at the University of São Paulo, where he got his degree in History and his Masters and PhD in Sociology. He works with labour market and urban development. In addition to other relevant publications, he is the co-author of "Os Cavaleiros do Antiapocalipse: trabalho e política na indústria automobilística" (2000) in partnership with Francisco de Oliveira, and of "Caminhos para o Centro: estratégias de desenvolvimento para a área central de São Paulo" (2004).

Arilson Favareto

Favareto holds a PhD in Environmental Science from the University of São Paulo (2006). He was a visiting researcher at the École des Hautes Études en Sciences Sociales in Paris. Paz & Terra Publishing/Anpocs. 2002; winner of the 2000 CNPq- Anpocs award for best PhD in Social Sciences); and *Joaquim Nabuco: os salões e as ruas* (Joaquim Nabuco: the salons and the streets (Companhia das letras, 2007; nominated for the Jabuti literary award and the Brazil-Portugal Telecom award).

She graduated in Social Sciences from the University of São Paulo (1969), holds a PhD in Political Science from the University of São Paulo (1979) and a post-doctorate from the University of California, Berkeley (1984). Among her publications is the book *Crise econômica e interesses organizados* (Economic crisis and organized interests - EDUSP) and the article "Privatization: reform through negotiation." She was a director of the International Relations Institute at USP (2010-2013). She was a visiting researcher in the Institute of Latin American Studies at London University (1992), Tinker Visiting Professor in Stanford University (1996), visiting professor in the Latin America Doctoral Program at the Ortega y Gasset Institute (2000, 2001 and 2002), visiting Professor in the Department of Political Science at Université de Montréal (2006), and a visiting researcher in the King's College Institute Brazil, University of London (2012). She participated in the Executive Committee of the Latin American Studies Association (2001-2004), the Executive Committee of the International Political Science Association (2006-2009), and was president of the Brazilian Association of Political Science (2004-2008) and the Latin American Studies Association (2010 - 2012). She is currently a member of the Brazil Institute Advisory Board and the Latin American Program at the Woodrow Wilson Center for Scholars (Washington), the Council of Eminent Persons of the World Bank Chief Economist, and the Academic Commission of the European Union-Latin America and the Caribbean Foundation (EU-LAC Foundation). She was awarded by the president with the National Order of Scientific Merit, in the Comendador category (2006) and received the Academic Excellence Award in Political Science from ANPOCS (2013).

Research areas: public policy; public opinion and foreign policy.

Miriam Dolhnikoff

Miriam Dolhnikoff holds PhD in History from FFLCH-USP. She is a Professor in the Department of History at FFLCH-USP.

Research Area: Brazil's political history in the nineteenth century.

Nadya Araujo Guimarães
